The meeting was called to order by the Chair, *Warden Russell Boucher*.

Warden Boucher and Deputy Warden McCarron then presented Denise Fougere with a gift and flowers marking her 25 years as a County employee. The Warden thanked Denise for her dedication over the last 25 years and noted that Council and Staff look forward to working with her in the future.

**APPROVAL OF AGENDA**

The Warden called for any additions or deletions to the Agenda as presented.

The following items were deleted from the Agenda. Items #4, 6 & 7.

**Min #2013-134 (Approval of Agenda)**

*MOVED by Councillor Donnie MacDonald, SECONDED by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron that the agenda be approved as amended. Motion carried.*

### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

The Warden called for any errors or omissions to the Minutes of October 15, 2013 meeting of Municipal Council three times. Hearing none, he called for approval of the Minutes as presented.

**Min #2013-135 (Approval of Minutes – October 15, 2013)**

*MOVED by Councillor Vaughan Chisholm, SECONDED by Councillor Angus Bowie that the minutes of the October 15, 2013 Meeting of Municipal Council be approved as circulated. Motion carried.*

### **BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES**

There was no business arising from the minutes.

### **PRESENTATION – Honourable Randy Delorey**

The Honourable Randy Delorey, Minister of Environment and Minister of Gaelic Affairs, MLA for Antigonish then appeared before Council.

Warden Boucher extended thanks to the Honourable Minister for coming to meet with Council.

Mr. Delorey indicated that as MLA for Antigonish, he wanted to assure Council that he is available to meet with Council if there are issues that Council thinks could be moved forward on a Provincial Agenda. He noted that, for the most part, Council represents the constituents that he does, so there is a common interest and a common goal and objectives.

Recently, the Minister of Service Nova Scotia & Municipal Relations attended the UNSM Conference and commented on the goals of the Provincial government to work with Municipalities collectively to move this Province forward.

Minister Delorey indicated that his office is being set up on Main Street and Shannon Long has been hired as the Constituency Assistant.

Council members extended good luck wishes to Mr. Delorey. Warden Boucher thanked Minister Delorey for coming in and noted that this hasn't happened very often that a member of the Legislative has graced our Council Chambers.

### **MUNICIPAL SIGNAGE STRATEGY**

Some time ago, Municipal Council discussed the idea of developing a signage (wayfinding) strategy and the RDA did some preliminary work on developing a signage program that would welcome visitors to Antigonish County, its various communities and points of interest within those communities.

At this point, Staff is looking for an indication of Council's priorities for signage. More specifically, is Council interested in community based signage or wayfinding signage?

Councillor Boucher indicated that Council members have the information as a basis to start a dialogue.

### **ROAD NAME CHANGES**

- 1) The Eastern District Planning Commission and the NS Department of Transportation & Infrastructure Renewal have been asked to comment on the proposed name for the Road currently known as Road D-3. Both have accepted the name Rose Lane for this road.

**Min #2013-136 (Road Naming – Rose Lane)**

*Moved by Councillor Angus Bowie, SECONDED by Councillor Rémi Deveau that Road D-3 in Bayfield be renamed to Rose Lane. Motion carried.*

- 2) The Eastern District Planning Commission and the NS Department of Transportation & Infrastructure Renewal have been asked to comment on the proposed name for the Road currently unnamed in Upper Pomquet. Both have accepted the name Pear Tree Lane for this road.

**Min #2013-137 (Road Naming – Pear Tree Lane)**

*Moved by Councillor Rémi Deveau, SECONDED by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron that a currently unnamed Road in Upper Pomquet be given the name Pear Tree Lane. Motion carried.*

- 3) A Petition has been received from residents on an unnamed Private Road in Georgeville. The residents are proposing Northumberland Lane as the name for their road.

**Min #2013-138 (Unnamed Private Road – Georgeville)**

*Moved by Councillor Mary MacLellan, SECONDED by Councillor Donnie MacDonald that the proposed name for a currently unnamed Private Road in Georgeville be tabled and forwarded to the Eastern District Planning Commission & the NS Department of Transportation & Infrastructure Renewal for comment. Motion carried.*

### **WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS**

Section 139 of the Motor Vehicle Act for the Province of Nova Scotia prohibits vehicles from obstructing snow removal or any other winter maintenance that may be necessary. The Act also allows for such vehicles to be removed at the owner's expense. These Winter Parking Regulations require the approval of Municipal Council and the Municipal Traffic Authority with the RCMP.

**Min #2013-139 (Winter Parking Regulations)**

*Moved by Councillor Hughie Stewart, SECONDED by Councillor Rémi Deveau that Municipal Council approve the signing of the Order for Winter Parking Regulations for 2013/14 setting out the period from December 1, 2013 to April 15, 2014 between the hours of 12:01 am and 7:00 am as the time in which Winter Parking Regulations will be in effect on roads/streets under the jurisdiction of the County of Antigonish. Motion carried.*

## **SUSTAINABILITY PARTNERS FOR CLIMATE PROTECTION PROGRAM**

Councillor Donnie MacDonald then reviewed a recommendation from the ICSP Committee for the County to join the FCM-ICLEI (Local Governments for Sustainability) Partners for Climate Protection Program.

The rationale for joining includes:

- Council would become part of a national local government movement in support of sustainability.
- Access to resources: human, educational and financial.
- Public recognition of the County's work re: Sustainability, which raises the profile both locally and nationally of the County.
- Reaching milestones of the program helps set goals and sense of accomplishment.

It was noted that there is no cost associated with joining this program.

### **Min #2013-140 (Resolution – FCM-ICLEI)**

*Moved by Councillor Donnie MacDonald, SECONDED by Councillor Mary MacLellan that Council approve the Resolution to join the FCM-ICLEI (Local Governments for Sustainability) Partners for Climate Protection Program. Motion carried (Resolution attached)*

## **CORRESPONDENCE**

- Correspondence has been received from the Canadian Union of Postal Workers requesting that Council consider passing two Resolutions. One calls on the Minister Responsible for Canada Post to use the upcoming review of the Canadian Postal Service Charter to focus on revenue-generating services, not cuts, including financial services such as bill payments, insurance and banking. The second Resolution asks to improve the Canadian Postal Service Charter and make the upcoming review of the Charter open to public input.

Mr. Horne noted that he had reviewed the information at the request of the Warden and he expressed the feeling that if Council wishes to support the Canadian Union of Postal Workers, it is at liberty to do so. However, Mr. Horne added that Council not endorse the recommendations or the "Be It Resolved" clauses as presented.

Deputy Warden McCarron indicated that he wished to make a comment with respect to Canada Post. Over the last three months, he has been trying to address new mailbox issues in his community. Community mailboxes have been placed in areas where people were opposed because rural delivery was being taken away. A request had gone to Canada Post to have a community mailbox placed at the Seniors Complex at St. Andrews and Deputy Warden McCarron indicated that he has been given a complete run around from Canada Post. To date, there has been no satisfaction. The goal is just to have a community mailbox put in the Seniors Complex so the Seniors do not have to walk into the Village for their mail. This would be especially challenging during the winter months.

Deputy Warden McCarron noted that perhaps Canada Post should come to rural Nova Scotia when it comes to community mailboxes.

Warden Boucher noted, as well, that hours have been cut at the Post Office in Havre Boucher.

Mr. Horne will draft a letter to Canada Post and bring it back for Council to review.

- A response has been received from Department of Transportation & Infrastructural Renewal regarding the request from Council to lower the speed limit from 80 km to 70 km along the old 104 leading to the three way stop at Beech Hill from Church Street Extension.
- Correspondence has been received from the Miniature Horse Association thanking Council for their support.
- A note of thanks has been received from the Heatherton Activity Centre, as well.
- A card of thanks has also been received from Responsible Energy Action thanking Council for their commitment to sustainability in our community.

**Min #2013-142 (Water Utility Budget)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Rémi Deveau that the 2013/14 Water Budget be approved as presented. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-143 (Sponsorship – Strait Pirates Junior B Hockey Club)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Angus Bowie that the County sponsor the Eastern Canadian Junior B Championships in the amount of \$1,000.00. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-144 (Uncollectible property taxes)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Vaughan Chisholm that the County approve the write off for taxes on Account #05471818 in the amount of \$1,334.36 due to being double assessed. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-145 (Highway Signage)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Donnie MacDonald that the County replace two damaged Visitor Information Centre signs in an approximate amount of \$700.00. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-146 (VIC Sign on Highway 104)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Mary MacLellan that the County, cost share with the Town of Antigonish, the costs for two VIC signs at Exit 32 from both the East and West ends at a price of \$600.00 each. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-147 (Council Special District Grant Policy)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Angus Bowie that the Council Special District Grant Policy be approved as presented. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-148 (Sewer Bill Write off)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Hughie Stewart that the sewer on account #02150026.00 be written off in the amount of \$583.40, which will make this account inactive. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-149 (FCM Sustainable Communities Conference)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Pierre Boucher that 1 Staff Member and 2 Council Members be approved to attend the FCM Sustainable Communities Conference in Charlottetown, PEI from February 11<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup>, 2014. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-150 (Assistant to the Director of Finance)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Donnie MacDonald that Vera Rhynold be offered the position of the Assistant to Director of Finance. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-151 (Typhoon Victims)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Mary MacLellan that the County donate \$500.00 in aid of the Victims of the Typhoon in the Philippines. Motion carried.*

**Planning Advisory Committee Report – November 18, 2013**

**Min #2013-152 (Amend the Antigonish County Subdivision By-Law)**

*Moved by Councillor Mary MacLellan, SECONDED by Councillor Hughie Stewart that the Application for an amendment to the Antigonish County Subdivision By-Law with regard to private roads by allowing the existing "six lot rule" Section 33 which states: "A maximum of six lots abutting an existing private road which does not satisfy Section 29(1)(b) and (c) may be approved after December 1, 2005" to apply to branch roads within an existing "Private Roads" Subdivision be approved on 1<sup>st</sup> Reading and proceed to Public Hearing. Motion carried.*

Discussion was held before the vote was taken on the motion to amend the Subdivision By-Law. Items (1) and (3) on the Staff Report from the Eastern District Planning Commission have been sent back for additional work.

**Min #2013-153 (Eastern Antigonish County Plan Area)**

*Moved by Councillor Mary MacLellan, SECONDED by Councillor Hughie Stewart that the amendments to the Land Use By-Law for the Eastern Antigonish Planning Area to amend the Definition of a Recycling Depot and to add a Recovery Depot as a permitted use in the Rural (R-1) Zone in response to a proposal by Yvonne DeCoste be approved on 1st Reading and proceed to Public Hearing. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-154 (Amendments to the Municipal Planning Strategy Land Use By-Law)**

*Moved by Councillor Mary MacLellan, SECONDED by Councillor Hughie Stewart that the amendments to the Municipal Planning Strategy and Land Use By-Law for the Antigonish Fringe Planning Area to re-designate six (6) properties to Commercial, and to permit large scale commercial developments by development agreement within the Commercial Designation in response to a proposal by Nova Construction Co. Ltd. for lands at the intersection of Highway 104 and Trunk 7 be approved on 1<sup>st</sup> Reading and proceed to Public Hearing. Motion carried.*

Councillor MacFarlane questioned if topics such as pedestrian safety, secondary roads have been considered. Also has consideration been given to whether the existing infrastructure can handle such a development? Water pressure in that area is a concern as well and Councillor MacFarlane wondered if that had been addressed.

Mr. Horne indicated that the water issue would have to be addressed should this proposal go forward.

**Committee of the Whole Report**

Mr. Horne noted that there was only one report and that was from the meeting on October 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Min #2013-155 (DEANS )**

*Moved by Councillor Hughie Stewart, SECONDED by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron that a letter be forwarded to the DEANS Board supporting, in principle, the proposed levy on fixed roof accommodations. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-156 (Wayfinding Signs)**

*Moved by Deputy Warden Owen McCarron, SECONDED by Councillor Donnie MacDonald that the proposed cost sharing on wayfinding signs in the Town of Antigonish be approved in the amount of \$6,200.00. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-157 (Chip Seal - Ohio)**

*Moved by Councillor Hughie Stewart, SECONDED by Councillor Pierre Boucher that a Petition to chip seal the Ohio East Road be supported and forwarded to the Minister of Transportation & Infrastructure Renewal, the Department's Manager and local MLA. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-158 (NSPI pole – 4-Valleys Fire Dept)**

*Moved by Councillor Mary MacLellan, SECONDED by Councillor Hughie Stewart that the Municipality take responsibility for the street light on the NSPI pole immediately outside the 4-Valley's Fire Department. Motion carried.*

**Min #2013-159 (Arena Additional capital projects)**

*Moved by Councillor Mary MacLellan, SECONDED by Councillor Rémi Deveau that the Municipality provides \$37,500 to the Antigonish Arena for additional capital projects. Motion carried.*

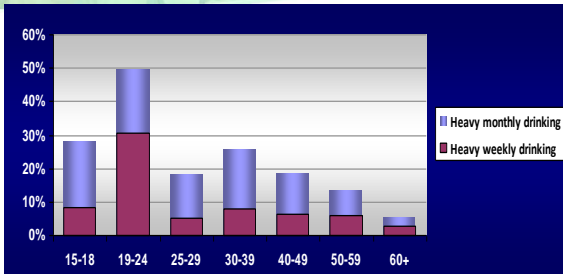

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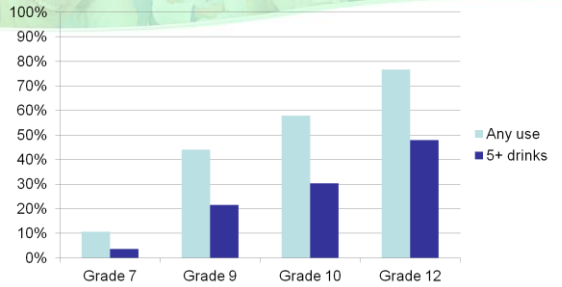

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**Alcohol Use by Grade Level, 2012**



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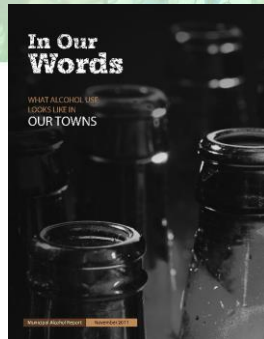

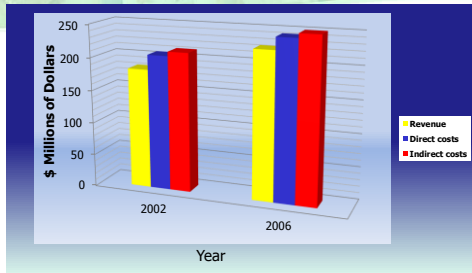

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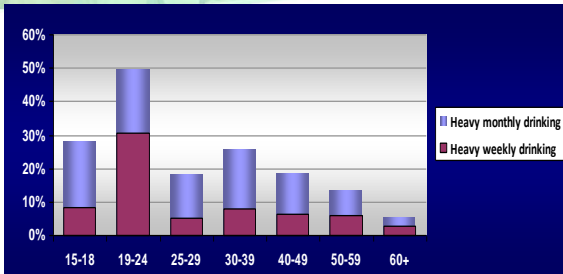
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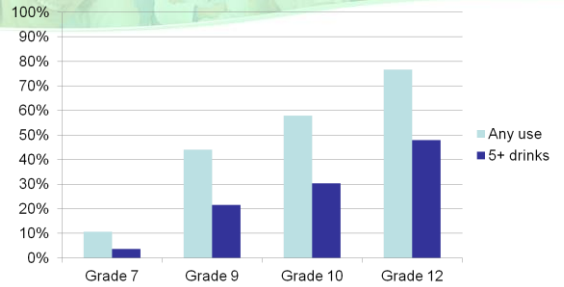
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**Alcohol Use by Grade Level, 2012**



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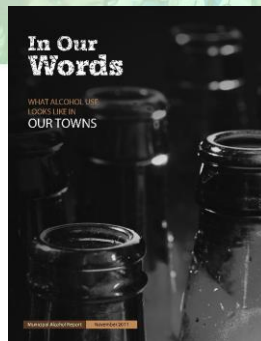
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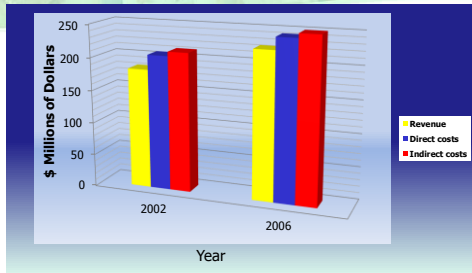

BE IT RESOLVED that the following be and the same is hereby adopted and enacted as a By-law of the Municipality of the County of Antigonish when and if the same has received the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, and that the Municipal Clerk be and he is hereby instructed to forward the same to the Minister and request his approval hereof.

| Short<br>Title                        | 1. This By-law shall be known as, and may be cited as, the "Mischiefs and Nuisances By-law".   |
| Noises                                | 2. No person shall without reasonable cause ring a bell, shout or make other unusual noises in the roads or streets, or knock at a door, or ring a doorbell, between the hours of ten o'clock in the evening and eight o'clock in the morning.   |
| Public<br>Address<br>Systems,<br>etc. | 3. (i) Except between the hours of twelve o'clock noon and one thirty o'clock the following morning, of any day except Sunday, no loudspeaker, microphone, amplifier or other transmitting apparatus connected with a radio, phonograph or other sound transmitting instrument or apparatus shall be operated in the Municipality so that the sound transmitted is projected beyond the distance of three hundred feet;<br><br>(ii) Any person who<br><br>(a) owns, operates, or has in his possession, or control, a transmitting apparatus contrary to the provisions of Subsection (i) of this Section; or<br><br>(b) permits a transmitting apparatus to be operated on his premises, or in or on his automobile contrary to the provisions of Subsection (i) of this Section;<br><br>shall be guilty of an offence; |

(iii) This Section shall not apply to any horn, whistle, bell, or broadcasting device used

- (a) by any church;
- (b) for summoning or directing employees; or
- (c) for the public interest or safety.

(iv) The times mentioned in Subsection (i) of this Section shall be either Atlantic Standard Time or Atlantic Daylight Time, whichever is in force at the time.

Loitering

4. No person shall loiter on or around the steps or entrances of buildings, or on roads, streets or sidewalks.

Trespassing

5. (i) No person shall enter a private dwelling or place of business without the permission of the owner or occupant, or remain therein after he has been requested to withdraw by the owner or occupant.

(ii) If a person is requested to withdraw from such premises and neglects or refuses to do so he may be removed therefrom by a peace officer on the request of the owner or occupant.

6. No person shall remove, damage or hide any gate, fence or door unless authorized to do so by the owner or occupant of the premises to which such gate, fence or door is appurtenant.

7. No person shall deposit stones, sand, soil, garbage, filth, ashes or other refuse on any premises unless authorized to do so by the owner or occupant.

Firearms

8. No person shall without due regard to both the safety of others as well as the possibility of causing damage to the property of others, discharge any gun or other firearm in or near any public place or way, or in or near any dwelling, store or other building, or in any cultivated field, or in any enclosure.

9. No person shall buy, sell or keep any air rifle, air gun or sling shot.

Animals

10. No person shall establish or maintain, or cause to be established or maintained any kennel, fox or such animal farm or other similar establishment which by reason of smell, noise, pests or escaping animals, causes annoyance to the public or to the occupants of neighboring properties.

11. No person shall establish, maintain or operate or cause to be established, maintained or operated a garage or body repair shop so as to cause annoyance to the public or to the occupants of neighboring properties.

Parked

12. No person shall cause annoyance by allowing motors to run in parked trucks or other vehicles between the hours of midnight and seven o'clock in the morning so as to disturb persons occupying premises nearby who may be affected by such noise.

Pigsties

13. (a) No person shall establish or cause to be established a pigsty, or permit a pigsty to be established on property owned by him within two hundred feet of any public place, way or building, or so as to cause annoyance to the public or to the occupants of neighbouring properties;

(b) No person shall expand an existing pigsty which is located within two hundred feet of any public place, way or building, or so as to cause annoyance to the public or to the occupants of neighbouring properties.

Speedboats

14. No person shall drive or operate a motorboat on any lake or river over which the Legislature of the Province of Nova Scotia has authority at a speed greater than is reasonable in the circumstances or in a manner so as to endanger the safety

of or to incommode others.

Ice  
Cutting

15. (i) Where a person cuts ice on any pond, river, lake or stream, he shall, before leaving the place where such ice is cut, guard the opening on all sides with a fence of brush, poles, wire or other materials sufficient to prevent accidents.

(ii) The brushes used for the brushing shall be at least six feet above the ice and be placed no further than fifty yards apart.

(iii) No person shall remove a fence so erected until all reasonable possibility of accidents from the lack of such fence has ceased.

(iv) Every person who removes such brushes or marks shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty

16. Every person who contravenes a provision of this By-law shall be liable to pay a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding two months.
