This Year VON Canada celebrated 120 years of service "Together in Care". VON continues to help Canadians stay Healthy and at Home. VON Antigonish is approaching its 20th Anniversary, we invite you our supporters and community members to celebrate our success in serving the community of Antigonish.

Nova Scotia leads Canada with the highest average number of people turning 65 each year. The need to provide supportive programs and services in both the home and community has never been greater. VON Antigonish continues to meet these needs for our local community with our nursing services and through our community programs. **This past year: 18,116** in-home medical visits were made by our dedicated nursing team who work **7 days** a week, **365 days** a year; **4,752 hot meals** were received through Meals on Wheels; our Assisted Transportation provided over **200 drives** to medical appointments, lab visits, grocery shopping and provided **12 out of town** medical appointments as far as Halifax to community members who did not have transportation. Re: Requirement to Notify the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities - *Municipal Government Act* SNS 1998, c. 18, Section 519

Please accept this letter as the notice to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities required by subsection 519(1) of the *Municipal Government Act* SNS 1998, c. 18, of legislation that will have the effect of decreasing the revenue received by municipalities in Nova Scotia or increasing the required expenditures of municipalities in Nova Scotia.

The Government of the Province has passed An Act to Amend Chapter 10 of the Acts of 1994-95, the *Workers' Compensation Act* on October 24, 2017 (Bill No. 7). In accordance with clause 12 of Bill No. 7, the legislation will come into force one year after the date on which it receives Royal Assent.

Bill No. 7 creates a presumption respecting causation of post-traumatic stress disorder for front-line or emergency-response workers (FERWs), including firefighters (both paid and volunteer) and police officers who are diagnosed with this condition. It is anticipated that the total number of claims for post-traumatic stress disorder and the total number of such claims that are accepted for coverage may increase due to the introduction of the presumption and that assessment rates and associated claims costs could also rise. As a result, the expenditures of municipalities in Nova Scotia that participate in the workers' compensation system could increase.

Rate-setting is a decision made by the Workers' Compensation Board (WCB). If the WCB decides to apply rate changes only to employers of FERWs, the additional annual claims costs to municipalities as a group, resulting from the introduction of the PTSD presumption would produce the following estimates (subject to claims experience), modelled on the basis of recent years' experience:

- Police and paid firefighters: \$23,000-\$47,000 (shared across all municipalities that have opted for WCB coverage of these workers)
- Volunteer Firefighters: \$52,400-\$107,200 (shared across all municipalities that have opted for WCB coverage of these deemed workers)

Alternatively, it is possible that the WCB could decide to allocate the costs of the presumption to all assessed employers in the Province due to the nature of the work of FERWs in protecting the public safety and providing for the public good. If the WCB were to follow this approach, it is estimated that it would cost WCB rate payers an additional \$0.01 (one cent) per \$100 of payroll. This means that a rate payer with a \$1 million payroll would see an increase of \$100 per year.

It is also possible that the legislation will result in a potential savings for employers due to the impact of successful early treatment on return to work, sick leave, short term illness and productivity. Identification of actual net costs and benefits will not be possible until the presumption is in effect for some time.

I trust that this is sufficient to provide you with notice of the legislation and ask that you please bring this letter to the attention of the Board of Directors of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities at your earliest opportunity.

Events:

- The month started off with a Sexualized Violence talk at St. FX. All of the freshman class (over 800) attended. The talk went over very well. The RCMP have been participating in this program for the past three years & it seems more students attend each year.
- In partnership with the St. FX Student Education Coordinator we were invited to do some substance abuse programming in all the campus residences. We visited eight residences over four evenings and spoke to over 200 students.
- Cst. MacPherson made visits to all the schools in Antigonish Town and County & spoke with the principals regarding programming we can offer. Plans were made for all the schools to get their mandatory Code Blue (lockdown) Drills completed before the end of September. Every school complied & we got all of the drills completed.
- In partnership with the Provincial Motor Carrier Branch we conducted radar in all our school zones to start off the school year.
- With the assistance of the Adopt a Library Program, Cst. MacPherson was able to deliver a box of free books to each school. He was even able to gather up a box of French books for Ecole Pomquet!

- Cst. MacPherson also represented the RCMP in the Anti-Bullying Day, led the Take Back the Night March in Antigonish, and was the guest speaker for the Respect for Women March.
- Monthly/Quarterly meetings with the Police Advisory Board, Crime Stoppers, EMO and Antigonish Crime Prevention Society were attended.
- The month culminated with St. FX Homecoming weekend which is traditionally the busiest weekend of the year for policing resources and calls for service. This year was no exception. In development is a working group with the university, town, county, police, health services and the student union to determine if there are better strategies going forward to lessen the impact of Homecoming on first responders, the town residents, and the health care system.

Resources

Three Constable vacancies currently exist at the detachment, all three positions have replacements identified and are awaiting home sales to move.

Another Constable has been transferred to the Montreal area, and will be departing near the end of November. His replacement has been identified and will be arriving the week following his departure.

A corporal has been transferred to the local traffic unit which works out of the Antigonish Office. She will be transferring as of November 1st. Her replacement has been identified and will be transferring in from Yarmouth when their home sells.

S/Sgt. Glassford has been temporarily assigned to the District Office for 3 months beginning September 11th. Sgt. McBeath will be the Acting Commander in her absence.

This Order is effective December 1, 2017 to and including April 15, 2018.

Schedule "A"

Regulations respecting the Winter Parking Ban made by the Provincial Traffic Authority under subsection 202(1) of Chapter 293 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Motor Vehicle Act*

Citation

1. These Regulations may be cited as the *Winter Parking Ban Regulations*.

Limitation on Parking

2. Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected which may permit motor vehicles to park or stand upon sections of highway during the hours stated thereon, no owner, driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park such vehicle upon any highway or any highway in the communities or subdivisions listed in Appendix "A":
 - (a) between the hours of 12:01 a.m. and 7:00 a.m.;
 - (b) in such a manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the removal of snow or ice from such highway unless it is attended by a person authorized and capable of operating it on a highway;
 - (c) from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped.

Exception

4. Section 2 shall not apply to:
 - (a) a motor vehicle operated by an emergency service provider.
