First, I'd like to wish farmers and fishers all the best for a plentiful and productive season.

As usual, there are a lot of exciting events lined up for Antigonish this summer, including Monster Trucks, Canada Day Celebrations, Festival Antigonish, Nova Scotia Hike Summit, Antigonish Highland Games, Nova Scotia Summerfest and more! I encourage you all to get out and enjoy the season with friends and family.

Summer is shaping up to be a busy construction season as well. The Antigonish Active Transportation Corridor, which is a partnership between the County, province and federal governments, will be breaking ground on a roundabout at the Church Street/Trunk 4 intersection. Appleseed Drive from D MacIsaac Road to Market Street will be paved.

Work is ongoing with the community centres across the County on our Net-Zero Community Buildings Project. With support from the provincial and federal governments, this project will see efficiency upgrades and investments in solar PV systems, significantly reducing their energy use, green house gas emissions and utility costs. Community centres are part of the fabric of our communities, and we are very happy to be able to support them in this way.

Our recreation department is busy planning for the summer programs, equipment loans, and Make Your Move Antigonish, which emphasizes simple movements like walking, gardening, standing, cycling and unstructured active play to be more active and feel better. I challenge everyone to think about what small ways they can be more active in their everyday activities.

MUNICIPAL ELECTION 2024


Municipal Elections will be taking place across Nova Scotia on October 19, 2024.

In order to run for council, you must:

- be 18 years of age at the time of nomination
- be a Canadian citizen
- be ordinarily resident in the municipality or in an area annexed to the municipality for 6 months preceding nomination day, and continue to so reside

You do not need to reside in the polling district of the municipality in which you wish to seek election, as long as you meet the residency requirement of six months in the municipality.

Recreational Equipment Available for Loan



Triad TMX T-5 is a robust tricycle suited for older children with an overall height of 47"(120cm) to 57"(145cm). It is fitted with 20" wheels, a caliper brake with parking brake feature and has a recommended maximum weight of 150lbs.

FRE DCP16 is a tricycle small enough for younger children but adaptable to fit most kids. Its direct drive and low gear ratios make pedaling easy for beginners. Inseam 20"-26" and maximum of 150lbs.

A Hippocampe is an all terrain wheelchair that gives its rider a sense of freedom to go anywhere and enjoy the great outdoors. Lightweight, compact, waterproof, & buoyant, this wheelchair provides accessibility to difficult terrain including the beach, snow, sand & mountains. It can be pushed or self-propelled and has a weight restriction of 250lbs-300lbs.





PFD-A's combine the safety of other PFD's while also providing extra head support. They allow the user to float while lying on their back and are difficult to overturn.

LJ-A's are a PFD that supports the upright position for disabled person. It allows the user to swim comfortably on their stomach and to float on their back.

Mobi Chair is a high quality, adjustable beach wheelchair that provides a seamless transition from boardwalk-to-beach-to-water for riders with low mobility. Equipped with large wheels, safety straps, & a push bar. Wheels and arm rests act as floatation devices allowing the rider to float in the water. The Mobi chair has a weight restriction of 300lbs.





Sledges are used to allow participants to enjoy a game of hockey or simply glide on the ice in a seated position. The sledges are equipped with a push bar as well as hockey sticks to help the rider propel themselves forward. Great equipment for riders with limited mobility or compromised balance.



Recreational Equipment Available for Loan



The TerraWheel is designed with the goal to provide the most versatile options for wheelchair users to maximize their outdoor experience and enjoy outdoor activities to their full ability.

A Snow Coach is a great sled for those who need lateral support and have good head, neck, & trunk support. The sled has a padded seat, safety straps, raised back support, a head rest, steal runner and a push handle.





AS 2000 is an adapted bike designed for riders age 14+. Fitted with 20" wheels and 7 speeds to give the option of selecting easy or challenging pedaling. Suitable for those with inseam 23"-34" and maximum recommended weight is 225lbs.

Adaptive canoe equipment including lashing bars to join two canoes together creating a stable platform to fish, motor, or sail. Canoe stabilizer floats are universal and designed to keep the canoe stable and upright. Drop in seats that are lightweight, durable and made of a strong aluminum frame holding up to 300lbs.





Personal Floatation Device (PFD) are available in 4 different sizes and they allow users to stay afloat. Sizes are infant, child, youth and adult.

SPORT & RECREATION FUNDING PROGRAMS



KIDSPORT

KidSport is a national children's charitable program that helps disadvantaged kids overcome the barriers preventing or limiting them from participating in organized sport. KidSport Nova Scotia provides funding up to \$500 per year per child for sport registration or equipment.

CANADIAN TIRE JUMPSTART



Canadian Tire Jumpstart is a community based charitable program to get children active. Jumpstart provides funding for sport or recreation fees to financially disadvantaged children so they can participate in recreational activities and organized sport.

BONVIE-MACDONALD RINKS TO LINKS



NHL'ers Dennis Bonvie and Craig MacDonald founded the Rinks to Links Golf Classic in 2004, they wanted to show their thanks and appreciation to their home communities by assisting children to get involved with minor hockey that might otherwise not have the opportunity. Funds raised at the tournament assists children with their registration and gear costs.

The Gary Boone Leadership Development Fund provides financial assistance to non-profit community groups and organizations for leadership training and development

Recreation Sport Cultural and Leadership Travel Assistance: Provides travel assistance to youth teams, clubs, or organizations travelling to sport or cultural competitions/tournaments outside of Antigonish County. Provides travel assistance to local youth who have been selected as members of a provincial or national team.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

LOW INCOME PROPERTY TAX REBATE: The Municipality of the County of Antigonish has a Tax Exemption Policy for Low-Income Tax Payers, those with a total household income of less than \$33,000*. The deadline to apply for the Low-Income Tax Exemption is December 31, 2024. *This number is subject to change.

The purpose of this policy is to assist low-income tax payers by providing a reduction of up to \$300 on their property tax bills (dwelling only).

- Interest charges will be applied if we do not receive payment by the <u>DUE DATE</u> shown on the bill.

IF YOUR PLANS INVOLVE TOOLS, FORGET BUILDING PERMITS!

The Municipality wants you to be safe. Building permits are how municipalities ensure buildings are built safely according to the National Building Code. Not only do building permits help ensure your safety, they reduce the risk of expensive future repairs if the work isn't done correctly.

In zoned areas there may be additional requirements.

Building without a permit is serious. It may result in unsafe conditions, expensive repairs, increased fees or even fines.

It's the law! If you know don't whether you need a permit, just remember:

YOU NEED A PERMIT FOR:

- New construction (Dwellings)
- Building a deck;
- Structural renovations; including rooftop solar.
- Non-structural renovation
 - Please call to confirm.
- Constructing a building over 20m² in area;
- Relocating a building;
- Demolishing a building, and;
- Changing the use of a building in a zoned area.

"When in doubt, call to find out!"

The Eastern District Planning Commission services the Counties of Antigonish, Inverness, Richmond and Victoria, as well as the Town of Antigonish and Port Hawkesbury.



DEVELOPING AND BUILDING IN ANTIGONISH COUNTY

In Nova Scotia, it is a legal requirement to obtain development and/or building permits before site development or building begins. The Municipality is a member of the Eastern District Planning Commission (EDPC) and has a team available to support you through the building and development process. Remember wherever a Land-Use Bylaw is in effect a **Development Permit** is required before a **Building Permit** can be issued. www.edpc.ca

Sean Donovan - Manager of Inspection Services. Contact Sean before you start construction to discuss your project, permits and inspections required, and timelines. Contact Wanda regarding any development plans—she will be happy to navigate the development process, whether it be questions about land use planning, zoning or development permit requirements. Andrew Jones - Senior Planner. Andrew will assist you with land use planning and help you to navigate zoning inquiries and rezoning. He can give you planning advice if you are considering developing your land. He is also the contact person for the Eastern Antigonish Municipal Planning Strategy review process. PERMITS & INSPECTIONS

For more information regarding development and building permits or to apply for a permit, contact the Planning Staff above. A copy of your plan including site and construction/building plans will be required.

Once you have a permit and work has begun, inspections are required at various stages, and are the responsibility of the homeowner. Inspections must be arranged with Inspector by the owner, the contractor or the developer.

FEATURED BY-LAWS

DOG CONTROL & REGULATION BY-LAW

Antigonish County is a great place to have a dog. Are you a responsible dog owner?

Responsible dog ownership in Antigonish County includes:

- Being familiar with, and following, the Municipality's Dog By-law.
- Keeping your dog on your property, and not letting them run loose off your property.
- Cleaning up your dog's waste.
- Not letting your dog be a nuisance by barking continuously.
- Not allowing your dog to chase people or their pets as they walk or cycle past your property.

The Municipality's Dog By-law can be found on the Municipality's website, or copies can be provided at the Municipal Office.

If your dog is off your property, it must be under your care and control with a leash. Dogs act differently away from home and can be distracted by wildlife, other pets, and people. Keeping your dog on a leash allows you to be able to keep your dog from approaching others who may not be comfortable around them and helps you to keep your dog safely away from moving cars and other animals.

The County has a Dog Control Officer who is authorized by the Municipality to enforce the Dog By-law. Enforcement can include warnings, fines, or the seizure of the dog.

The Chez Deslauriers property is located on a coastal rise in Monk's Head with commanding views of St. George's Bay, Pomquet Beach and Cape Breton in the distance. The property includes a heritage home (converted to a tearoom), an interpretive centre, and an outdoor stage. A 6 km coastal and inland walking trail directly to the north of the property.

The Chez Deslauriers property is maintained and administered by the Pomquet Development Society, a volunteer organization aimed at promoting the Acadian culture and encouraging tourism in the community.

BLUE BAG SAFETY TIPS

Always consider your safety and the safety of those collecting and sorting your recycling when preparing any item for the blue bag.

<u>Step 1 (Safety Rinse)</u> Carefully rinse the can - some people use a bottle brush and it is easiest if you do it soon after opening the can!

<u>Step 2 (Lid Safety)</u> If the lid is attached to the can, carefully push it down into the can so that the sharp edge is not exposed. If the lid has been completely removed from the can, it is best to drop it into the can and then, if possible, squeeze the top of the can to close the opening as much as possible. Then place it into your blue bag. If you use a can opener that removes sharp edges, you will not be able to place the lid into the can. Place these lids into the blue bag separate from the can.

PREVENT LITTER & KEEP OUR ROADS SAFE



When transporting waste for disposal, material must be covered and secured to prevent litter. Material blowing off the back of an open vehicle is considered littering and creates unsafe road conditions.

The Motor Vehicle Act requires open loads to be secure The fine for an untarped load is \$240.37

What is considered a secure load?

A secure load does not slide or shift in a vehicle or trailer and materials cannot fall or blow out. If any part of the load can (or has the potential to) escape the vehicle, the load is not secure.



Tips For Securing Material

- Put light materials on the bottom, heavier materials on top.
- Secure heavier materials directly to the vehicle using ropes, chains or straps.
- · Don't overload the vehicle or trailer.
- · Cover load with a tarp.
- Secure tarps using netting, ropes, straps, or bungee cords.
- Do not leave loose debris in the open bed of a truck.

SAFE SHARPS BRING BACK PROGRAM

PAINT RECYCLING PROGRAM

Includes leftover household paint and the container, plus paint aerosol containers. There is no fee to drop-off for recycling at an approved location. This includes interior and exterior paints, deck coating and floor paint, concrete and masonry paint, primers, drywall paint, stucco paint, wood finish, stain blocking paint, marine paint, anti-rust, metal stains and shellac, block fillers, wood, masonry and driveway sealers, or water repellents (non-tar or bitumen based) and empty cans NOTE: Cans must have a label and lid. The program does NOT include dry brushes, rags & rollers, paint in glass containers, improperly sealed cans, badly rusted, leaking or dented cans, bulging containers, industrial paints & finishes (eg. baked on or heat resistant), paints or wood preservative registered as a pesticide, non-aerosol craft and automotive paint, two-part or component paints with a catalyst or activator, roof patch or repair, tar, traffic or line marking paint, quick dry paint, resins, paint thinners, mineral spirits or solvents, deck cleaners, colourants and tints, caulking compound, epoxies, glues or adhesives. and other household chemicals.

BULKY WASTE COLLECTION

The Municipality of the County of Antigonish will be undertaking a **CURBSIDE** collection of items as part of its' solid waste resource management program.

Clean up items are only permitted to be placed at the curbside the night before your **normal day for garbage and organic collection only**. Items must be placed within 6 feet of the road by 7 am on the day of your collection. Items placed at road side that are not part of the curbside pickup, will not be accepted and must be promptly removed from the curb after the trucks have collected from your road. Each household, including apartment buildings of three units or less, are eligible for curbside collection. The maximum weight of individual items cannot exceed 50 lbs or one cubic meter in size, with the exception of furniture and appliances. Only one large item per household: for example, one fridge or one sofa. Maximum total waste accepted per household is not to exceed 330 pounds. Smaller items must be placed in clear bags or bundled for collection. More than one truck will pass by your house collecting various materials, so please be patient as the collection takes place.

Items **NOT** collected under the spring clean-up program:

- 1. construction and demolition material;
- 2. car bodies, large car parts;
- 3. tires
- 4. trees, large branches or leaf and yard waste;
- 5. waste paint, waste oil or other fluids;
- 6. loose broken glass;
- 7. used batteries:
- 8. asbestos:
- 9. hazardous, reactive, septic or pathological waste;
- 10. refrigerators with attached doors (refrigerators must have doors removed);
- 11. waste placed in non-transparent bags (such as black, green or orange bags);
- 12. electronics waste such as desktop and laptop computers, keyboards, computer monitors, televisions, scanners, and printers (these materials should be taken to ACES at the Solid Waste Resource Management Facility located on Beech Hill Road);
- 13. waste generated outside the Municipality;
- 14. waste placed in violation of the Municipality of the County of Antigonish By-Law Regarding the Collection and Disposal of Solid Waste; any other materials deemed unacceptable by the Municipality.

NOTE: All items with the exception of # 8 and #9 listed above can be disposed of at the Beech Hill Solid Waste Resource Management Facility, 1356 Beech Hill Road

SAFE BRUSH BURNING



Careless brush burning has been the cause of many wildfires. There are other alternatives to burning such as chipping and mulching. If you must burn brush do it safely.

- Remove all vegetation within 3 m of your firepit.
- Make sure there is little or no wind that can blow sparks or ash towards structures or vegetation.
- Firepit is located well away from structures & vegetation.
- Use a barrel to burn small brush.
 - Make sure it is good condition and at least 3 m away from vegetation.
 - Use steel rods or pipes to hold the burning material up from the bottom of the barrel.
 - Ensure a metal mesh screen (with openings no larger than 5mm) has been placed over the barrel opening.
- Soak ashes well and let sit in a metal container for at least 24 hours before disposing them in a pit.
- Keep fire fighting tools on hand; (a charged garden hose, shovel, rake, buckets)

During wildfire risk season (March 15-October 15), no domestic brush burning or campfires are allowed between 8:00am and 2:00 pm, except industrial permits. Burn restrictions are updated daily at 2:00pm at www.novascotia.ca/burnsafe.



WATER CONSERVATION

A clean and accessible water system is fundamental to a strong community. We are lucky that in Antigonish County, clean water that can be used for drinking, showering, cooking, and many other things, is just a turn of the tap away. Check out this video on municipal water protection and conservation in Antigonish: https://vimeo.com/185838269.

Since we are used to easily getting clean water, we often forget that there is a limit to the amount of water in our area and that water conservation is vital. With our climate changing, there is an impact on weather and on rainfall, leading to dryer conditions and water levels dropping. How we live and use the land in water supply areas affects the quality of our drinking water. Many land uses and everyday activities can cause pollution to water supplies. Residents can help reduce their impacts and protect drinking water supplies (quantity and quality) by practicing the following:

- Using fertilizers with low or no phosphorus, both on small pieces of land and large farms,
- Minimize the storm water escaping your property. Use rain barrels, and develop retention areas like gardens around your property,
- Inside use low flow toilets, tap aerators, water flow reducers and low flow shower heads,
- Support riparian buffer zones by allowing existing native plant species to establish themselves by water edges,
- Dispose of yard waste and clippings appropriately, and do not cut your lawn too short, or water unnecessarily.
- If you are on a private septic system, make sure you are inspecting it regularly and having it cleaned out every 3-5 years,
- If you see illegal dumping of waste or suspicious activity, especially in water supply areas please report it by calling Eastern Region Solid Waste Management team Office: 902-232-2563 or Toll-Free: 1-888-377-9622.

Tick Safety

Make sure you, your family and pets are protected against tick bites.

There are several kinds of ticks that can be found across Nova Scotia, but only the blacklegged tick carries the bacteria that causes Lyme Disease.

Ticks are commonly found in tall grass, bushes, wooded areas, urban parks and gardens.

There are simple precautions you can take while spending time outdoors.


- Wear light-coloured long-sleeved shirts and pants, and light-coloured socks with enclosed shoes (this makes ticks more visible)
- Tuck in your shirt and pull your socks up over pant legs
- Spray clothing and exposed skin with an insect repellent containing DEET or Icaridin (make sure you follow directions on the label)
- Check your clothing and body carefully for ticks after working or playing outside. Pay special attention to armpits, the back of the knees, and the groin or pelvic region
- Keep grass cut and remove leaves from your yard
- Put outdoor clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill any remaining ticks
- Always check yourself, your children, and pets for ticks after spending time outside


