## Call to Order - Chairman, Warden Nicholas MacInnis

The meeting of the Committee of the Whole was called to order by the Chair, Warden MacInnis, at 7:01pm.

#### Approval of Agenda

## Approval of January 14, 2025 Committee of the Whole Minutes

Warden MacInnis called for any errors or omissions in the Committee of the Whole minutes of January 14, 2025. Hearing none, the minutes were considered approved.

# **Business Arising from the Minutes**

There was no business arising from the minutes.

#### **Continuing Business**

#### Hospitality and Expense Policy Updates

Ms. Schumacher provided an update on the exercise of reviewing the Expense and Hospitality policies as required by the Municipal Government Act (MGA), specifically with respect to the request from the committee at their January 14<sup>th</sup> meeting for staff to review the per diems noted in the policy. Ms. Schumacher noted that amounts from a preliminary scan of provincial and municipal sources was listed in the staff memo, but that a suggestion had come from senior staff to defer making any updates to these figures until they have been reviewed as part of the compensation review that is currently underway. Staff is therefore recommending that the policies be readopted as-is, and that the motion include direction for further updates if the compensation review identifies that they are necessary.



#### Moved and Seconded

The Committee recommends that Municipal Council re-adopt the Policy on Municipal Council and CAO Expense Reimbursement and the Municipal Hospitality Policy as required by Section 23(7) of the Municipal Government Act, subject to the per diem information in the Policy on Municipal Council and CAO Expense Reimbursement being updated, if necessary, following the completion of the compensation review currently underway.

#### Off-Highway Vehicles

Mrs. Donovan provided a summary of information collected since direction was received at the January 14<sup>th</sup> meeting regarding off-highway vehicles and road trails designations in Richmond and Inverness Counties. Mrs. Donovan noted that after speaking with the CAOs from those municipalities, the road trails designations had been coordinated between the off-highway vehicle groups and the province, and that the municipalities had not been involved. She shared that information was included in the agenda package for councillors to share with riders in their community if they are interested in pursuing similar road trails designations. Discussion followed regarding the role of the municipality to write letters of support for those applications to the province.

#### **New Business**

#### Write-Off of Inactive Accounts

Mrs. Duggan provided an overview of the process of identifying non-collectable accounts, and some of the reasons why an account may not be collectable. Staff is currently recommending the write-off of three accounts, for a total of \$1,831.51.

#### Moved and Seconded

The Committee recommends that Municipal Council approve write-offs in the amount of \$1,831.51.

#### Council Special District Grants

Mrs. Donovan offered to the committee to put on an information session for Council to provide them with information about all the different funding streams available to councillors and the community through the municipality. Councillor MacLellan noted a concern that some councillors are using their Special District Grants up each year, while others are not spending theirs and have amassed large balances.

Mrs. Duggan provided some background on the trends in grant spending over the history of their availability, and what some of the grant funds have been spent on in the past. Discussion followed.



Concerns were raised about funds being saved up over several years and then spent immediately prior to the mandatory hiatus before an election. Concerns were also raised about post-election balances, where some councillors were left with no Special District Grant funds until the fiscal year ends. A suggestion was made to look at limiting how large the grant pools can be, through an amendment to the policy. A policy change could also address the concern about balances being fully depleted before an election.

A suggestion was made to give the issue at least a year and revisit the topic and look at any potential policy updates then after councillors have had an opportunity to go through at least one annual cycle of business. The information session about other funding streams could also take place in that time. A concern was raised with the structure of the grants giving the perception of the grant funding coming from the district councillor, particularly right before an election.

#### Moved and Seconded

The Committee recommends that Municipal Council direct staff to undertake a review of the Council Special District Grants and provide a presentation to the Committee in early 2027.

Introduction and Overview to Equity, Anti-Racism and Anti-Hate Plan for the Municipality of the County of Antigonish

Ms. Feltmate provided the committee with an overview of the provincial requirement to have Equity, Anti-Racism, and Anti-Hate Plan in place before April 1, 2025. Ms. Feltmate noted that work is already underway to develop this plan, and additional information will be coming forward, including conversations to facilitate plan development, in the coming months. Engagement and accessibility of the process of creating the plan was emphasized. Discussion followed.

- Councillor Melanson shared that every Wednesday in Pomquet there is card play.
   Pomquet Volunteer Fire Department recruited three new members on January 27<sup>th</sup>.
- Councillor MacLaughlin shared that Lochaber has regular card play on Monday nights and runs a breakfast every second Sunday of the month.
- Councillor Brophy shared that a pancake breakfast will take place at the Lions Club on the fourth Sunday of the month.
- Warden MacInnis shared that the St. Andrew's off-highway vehicle club will be meeting on Sunday February 2<sup>nd</sup>.





# WHAT IS EI?

Economic Impact Assessment (EIA) studies measure the positive change in economic activity resulting from hosting an event in a specific city / town. There are three factors:

- the spending of out-of-town visitors while they attend the event;
- the expenditures of the event organizers in producing the event;
- capital construction costs that are directly attributed to hosting the event.

An EI study calculates the amount of new money being spent in the host community as a direct result of hosting the event, and then the impact these new monies have on the regional, provincial and national economy as a whole.



# CSTA'S TOOL

The Canadian Sport Tourism Alliance (CSTA) has developed a tool called **steam pro**<sup>2.0</sup> that collects, measures and analyzes data across the three primary channels.

Our economic impact services empower event organizers and host cities to accurately assess economic impact resulting from hosting a specific event in a specific location.





# **MODEL OUTPUTS**

The elements (outputs of the model) used to measure the economic impacts are:

- Gross Domestic Product (GDP)
- Employment
- Taxes
- Industry Output
- Imports

CSTA's **steam pro<sup>2.0</sup>** measures the direct, indirect & induced effects for each of these elements.




# RELIABILITY OF THE MODEL

In order to produce economic contribution assessments that are robust and reliable, the CSTA has partnered with the Canadian Tourism Research Institute (CTRI) at The Conference Board of Canada. The CTRI serves the travel and tourism industry in providing sound economic forecasts and models with timely and insightful interpretation of data specifically relevant to travel.

The findings in this report make use of the most current and most detailed input-output tables and multipliers available from Statistics Canada and leverages the credibility and robustness of

sector specific tax data available from Statistics Canada's Government Revenues Attributable to Tourism (GRAT) report.

# **HOW IT WORKS**



# THE METHODOLOGY

The visitor statistics cited in this report were derived from an on-site intercept survey that was developed by CSTA's economic impact consultant for this assignment and administered by volunteer surveyors during the event. The CSTA provided on-site supervision of the survey process.

The CSTA intercept survey was customized for the event. Surveyors selected potential survey participants through a randomized process. A total of **281** valid responses were collected through the survey.

The survey included questions for the participants, spectators and others attending the Special Olympics Canada 2018 Summer Games in Antigonish related to spending, motivation and the number of days they were in the area attending the event. Additional questions provided event organizers with experience-related information.

This survey data, together with event budgets, capital costs, organizer-provided spectator attendance estimates and participant registration estimates were entered in the **steam pro**<sup>2.0</sup> economic impact model.











# What kind of accommodations are you using?






# Arrival in Antigonish




# Nights Stayed






# In total, how many hotel rooms is your party using each night?

# Travel to Antigonish



# Spending

The average party spent \$1,611 on their trip to Antigonish in relation to the **Special Olympics Canada 2018 Summer Games**. This was allocated among:

- Accommodations: \$611
- Restaurants: \$418
- Food And Beverages (at stores, including alcohol): \$142
- Other Retail/Shopping: \$149
- Recreation & Entertainment: \$33
- Vehicle Expenses In Antigonish: \$133
- Vehicle Rental: \$115

#### **Operational Spending**

Event hosting expenditures amounted to nearly \$3 million on a variety of goods and services.

Recasting the budget to align with steam pro<sup>2.0</sup> categories, the largest item was Transportation and Storage, followed by Accommodations.

#### Motivation

The Special Olympics Canada 2018
Summer Games in Antigonish was the single reason for travelling to Antigonish for nearly every attendee.

This was calculated based on a scale of 0 to 10, where 10 indicated the event was 'the only reason for traveling to Antigonish, and 0 indicated that the event was not at all a factor. These weightings are used to adjust the total spending on the basis of what share of visitor spending is attributed to the event

On average, the Special Olympics Canada 2018 Summer Games in Antigonish was 99% of the reason visitors stayed in Antigonish. Therefore, 99% of the direct visitor spending is attributed to the event.

### THE ECONOMIC IMPACT RESULTS

The spending of out—of-town athletes, family members, spectators and other visitors to the **Special Olympics Canada 2018 Summer Games in Antigonish**, in combination with the expenditures made by event organizers, **totaled \$7.2 million in direct spending**. This, in turn supported **\$8.7 million** in total spending (total Industry Output) in the Antigonish region, and just over **\$12.6 million** Canada-wide.

These expenditures supported \$3.6 million in wages and salaries across Canada. Of the 76 jobs Canada-wide, 49 jobs, and the majority of the household income (\$2 million) stayed in the Antigonish area.

The total net economic activity (total spending or total output) generated by the **Special Olympics Canada 2018 Summer Games in Antigonish** was (rounded):


- \$12.6 million for Canada as a whole
- \$10.7 million for the province of Nova Scotia; including
- \$8.7 million for Antigonish.

The event supported tax revenues totaling over \$1.9 million across Canada. The event supported federal government tax revenues of \$651,000 and contributed \$1.8 million in taxes for the Province of Nova Scotia, and \$93,000 in local taxes for Antigonish and area.



#### ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT

- EMO priority areas in 2025 include supporting fire chiefs with establishing the Antigonish Area Fire & Rescue Training Centre, reviewing regional fire mapping/ coverage, review Hazmat response capability for AREMO area.
- The Municipality received provincial funding through the Beautification and Streetscaping Program to install Gateway Signage for Secondary Highways - A design company has provided mock-ups for replacing missing or damaged gateway signs at key entry points into Antigonish County, including Highway 245 (Knoydart), Highway 7 (Lochaber), and Trunk 16 (south of Monastery).
- Communications Strategy An RFP for a Communications Strategy was issued in December 2024, with 11 proposals received by January 17, 2025. An internal committee reviewed the submissions and are recommending a consulting firm to evaluate current communication practices and develop a strategy to improve transparency, accountability, and engagement with staff, council, and the community.
- Councillor Profiles Councillor biographies will be added to the Municipal Website.
   A reminder email with profile questions has been sent, and councillors are encouraged to complete and return them. The final write-ups will be prepared internally and sent to councillors for approval before being published on the website.
- CAO attended:
  - Meetings with Nova Scotia Department of Public Works
  - o Monthly meeting with StFX, Town and County
  - Active Transportation Information Session
  - HAF meetings
  - TMR Radio Training
  - RK MacDonald Steering Committee Meeting
  - o AREMO Planning Committee Tabletop Exercise
  - AREMO Advisory Committee Meeting
- Preparations are underway for a regular Joint Town and County Joint Council meeting, to take place on Wednesday, February 19th.
- Municipal Council Strategic Priority Setting will be taking place February 24 and 25.
- The Housing Accelerator Fund (HAF) initiatives have seen movement forward on several milestones. The proposal for both the Town and County planning related



initiatives has been awarded, project kick off meeting held with an interim findings meeting scheduled for February 14, 2025. The next steps will be to bring draft findings to the respective Planning Advisory Committees prior to public engagement.

- The Community Transit initiative will see a final report for recommendations on next steps for Antigonish Community Transit Society (ACTS) fixed route improvements by the end of February. The HAF, along with provincial government funding, will assist with the implementation as per the ACTS board recommendations. More details on recommendations, financial requirements and requests for Council (should there be any), will be presented by an ACTS representative after their board meeting on the matter.
- The Modernization of the Permitting Process milestone of creating a working group for input on proposed process and new online portal will soon be formed. If Councillors have member suggestions from the developer community, please email Denise Dunn, Housing Accelerator Fund Coordinator, with the details.
- Director of Sustainable Communities is attending FCM Sustainable Communities
  Conference with Deputy Warden Dunbar, in Fredericton NB from Feb 10-13<sup>th</sup>.
  Theme of this years conference is *Build Connections, Future Proof your*Community and Embrace Solutions that work. We also have a colleague from
  Coady International institute attending exploring options for working together in
  the region. A full report will be shared after conference.
- Energy Net Zero Community Buildings Project is wrapping up. After update at COW a meeting was held in St. Joesph's on Jan 31 to trouble shoot the issue with NSP account and panel production. A plan is in place and hopefully all will be sorted in the next couple of weeks.
- Director of Sustainable Communities, Tammy Feltmate will be hosting an Energy Learning session for Council on Feb 18<sup>th</sup> from 5-7pm tentatively. You will have all received a calendar invite to hold the time. This will review the County's past and current projects, provide some tools for general knowledge and look at introduce current options.

#### OHS & W

- Annual safety day will be in early March, a date to come. Scheduling is a challenge this month with a large number of competing sessions and meetings.
- OHS& W meetings occurred, no incidents to report. A welcome and overview is going to new Council reps Councillor McNamara and Councillor Brophy as alternate.



- Work continues on Equity, Anti hate and Anti racism plan due April 1, 2025. Will
  provide an overview to Council and draft in coming weeks. Initial draft is being
  reviewed by AMANS support staff and provincial team
  members.
- Murals- Mural for district 4, Councillor Brophy's district will be hosted at the mini pitch and unveiled at the opening. The artist team is working on the mural at this time. An image will be shared with Council as soon as it is completed before installation. Mural was installed at Heatherton and Area Community Centre early December, Deputy Warden

Dunbar attended. We will discuss future locations in early March with Council.

 RFP for redesign of front entrance of 285 Beech Hill will be released for a second time the week of February 17<sup>th</sup>, Staff will send a copy to all council before releasing to share the information. This item is budgeted for design in this budget and numbers will be discussed for build/ retrofit during budget conversations and considerations. Main objectives are to maximize accessibility, energy management and storm/ weather mitigation on front entrance.

#### FINANCE DEPARTMENT

- Finance staff imported and balanced the 2025 Tax Roll from PVSC onto Diamond Municipal Solutions (14,971 parcels of land).
- Approximately 1,800 Water bills have been prepared and stuffed in envelopes waiting to be mailed.
- Two Finance department staff are board members on the County's Occupational Health and Wellness committee which meet monthly.
- Finance Department has been focusing on cross training within the department on targeted tasks.
- Finance Staff have been utilizing some training opportunities with Central Square (Diamond Software Product).
- Director of Finance is working with the CAO on the compensation review for council and staff.
- Finance department is on the AMTC board and is sharing responsible for maintenance of their website.
- Ongoing day to day operations (collections, reconciliations, payroll, property tax and utility customer maintenance, bill payments, monthly HST remittances, etc.).
- Member of the Finance Department is a board member for Strait IT. Board meetings occur monthly.
- Finance staff support the Antigonish Arena in the role of financial accounting (day to day accounting, year end audit preparation, HST remittances, reconciliations, etc.).

SUBJECT: GATEWAY SIGNAGE ON SECONDARY HIGHWAYS

**DATE:** FEBRUARY 11, 2025

The County secured \$25,000 through the Beautification and Streetscaping Program, which will be matched by the municipality to fund several projects. These include a mural at the Antigonish Scotiabank Mini-Pitch, enhancements along the AT Corridor, and the replacement of missing or damaged gateway signage on secondary highways.

The new 5x7 signs will be installed at key entry points into Antigonish County, including:

- Highway 245 (Knoydart)
