Call to Order- Deputy Warden Dunbar

Warden MacInnis called the meeting to order at 7:34pm.

Approval of Agenda

Warden MacInnis called for approval of the Council meeting agenda.

That the agenda be approved as presented.

Consideration of the January 13, 2026 Municipal Council Minutes

Warden MacInnis called for any errors or omissions in the minutes of January 13, 2026. Hearing none, the minutes were considered accepted as presented.

Business Arising from the Minutes

There was no business arising from the minutes.

Statutory Public Hearing

Mrs. Donovan read through the Public Hearing protocols for the benefit of those in attendance.

Proposed amendments to the Subdivision By-law, the Municipal Planning Strategies, and the Land Use By-laws for the West River Antigonish Harbour, Central Antigonish, Eastern Antigonish County, and Keppoch Beaver Mountain planning areas, as initiated through a review done as part of the Housing Accelerator Fund (HAF).

Mr. Bain provided members of Council with a review of the process that led to the proposed amendments under consideration this evening, being amendments to the Subdivision By-law and various planning documents to support housing growth in the community as encouraged by the Housing Accelerator Fund. He spoke to how definitions are proposed to be changed to make them uniform across the different plans, the movement of policies regarding accessory units to the general regulations instead of the specific zones, and the changes regarding private roads in the Subdivision By-law.

A question was asked about permits for accessory dwellings, and what is expected once the amendments are made if they are successful. Clarification was provided by staff that the proposed changes to the Local Improvements By-law were removed in advance of first reading by Council, and would not be under consideration for approval this evening. Further questions were asked regarding servicing and road types.

The floor was then opened for those looking to speak in favour or against the proposed amendments. There were no parties that identified that they were present to speak in favour or against the proposed amendments.

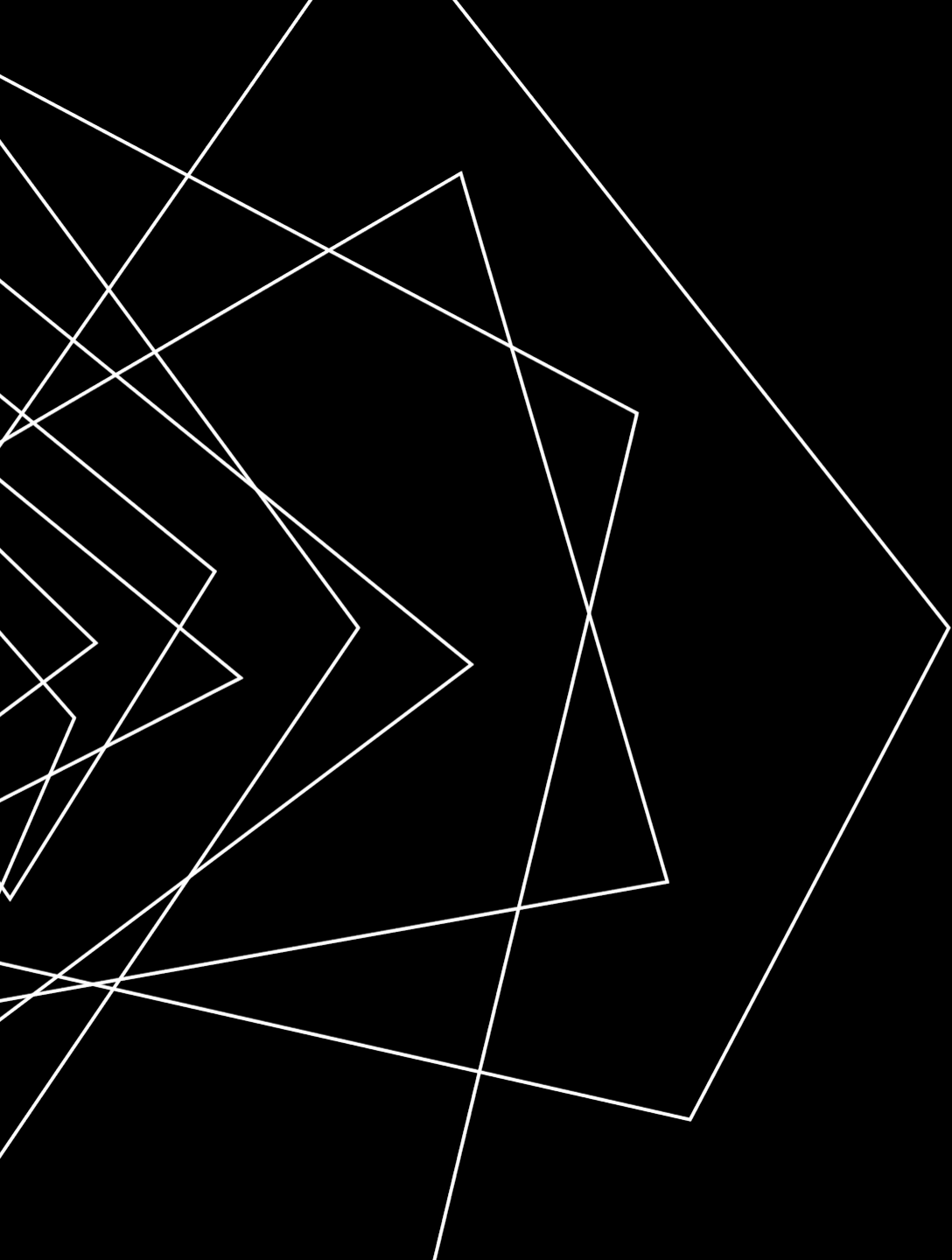
AN URGENT LOCAL HOUSING GAP

This project has been made possible through a generous donation of 16 hectares of land by Dr. Amy Hendricks and Paul Davie.

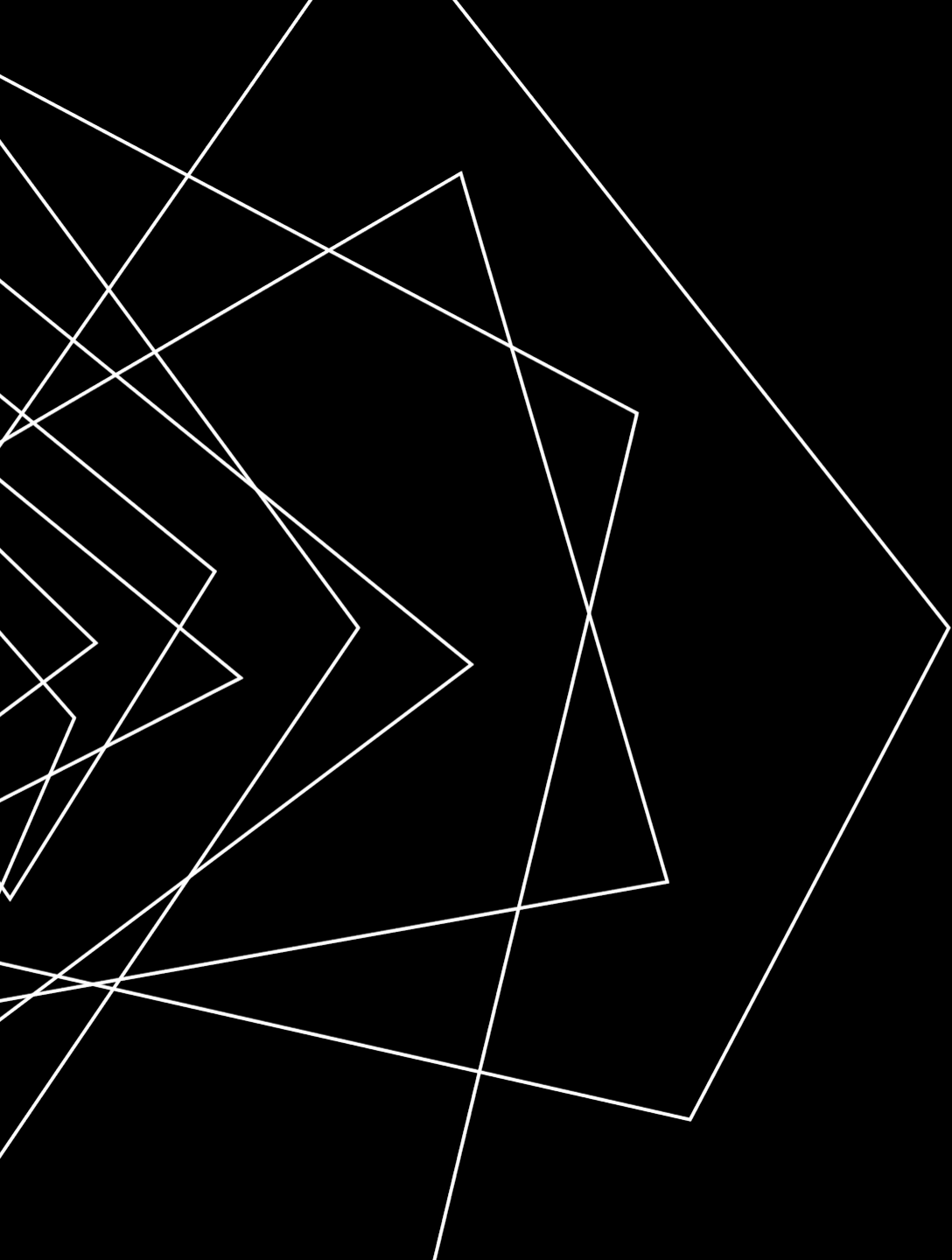

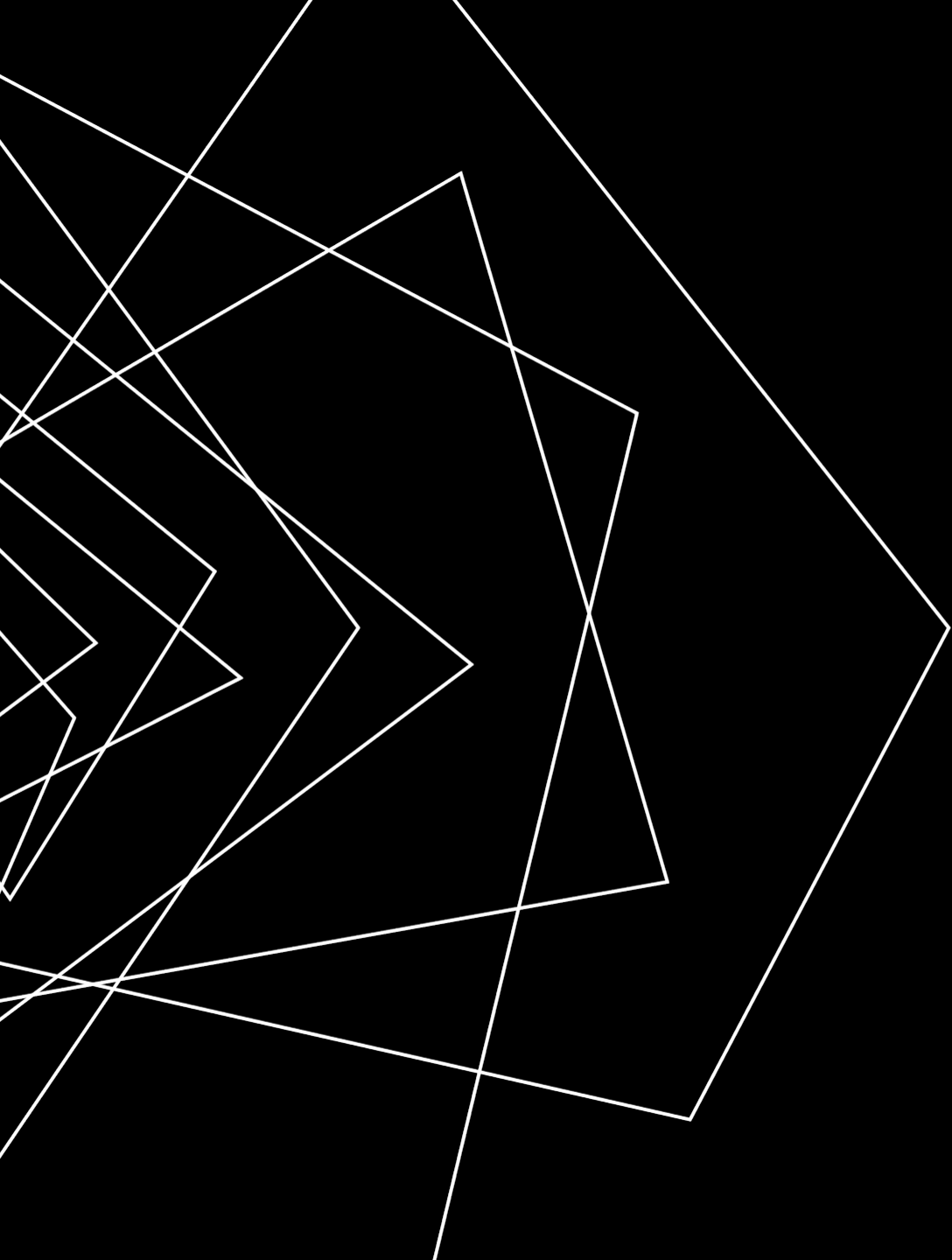

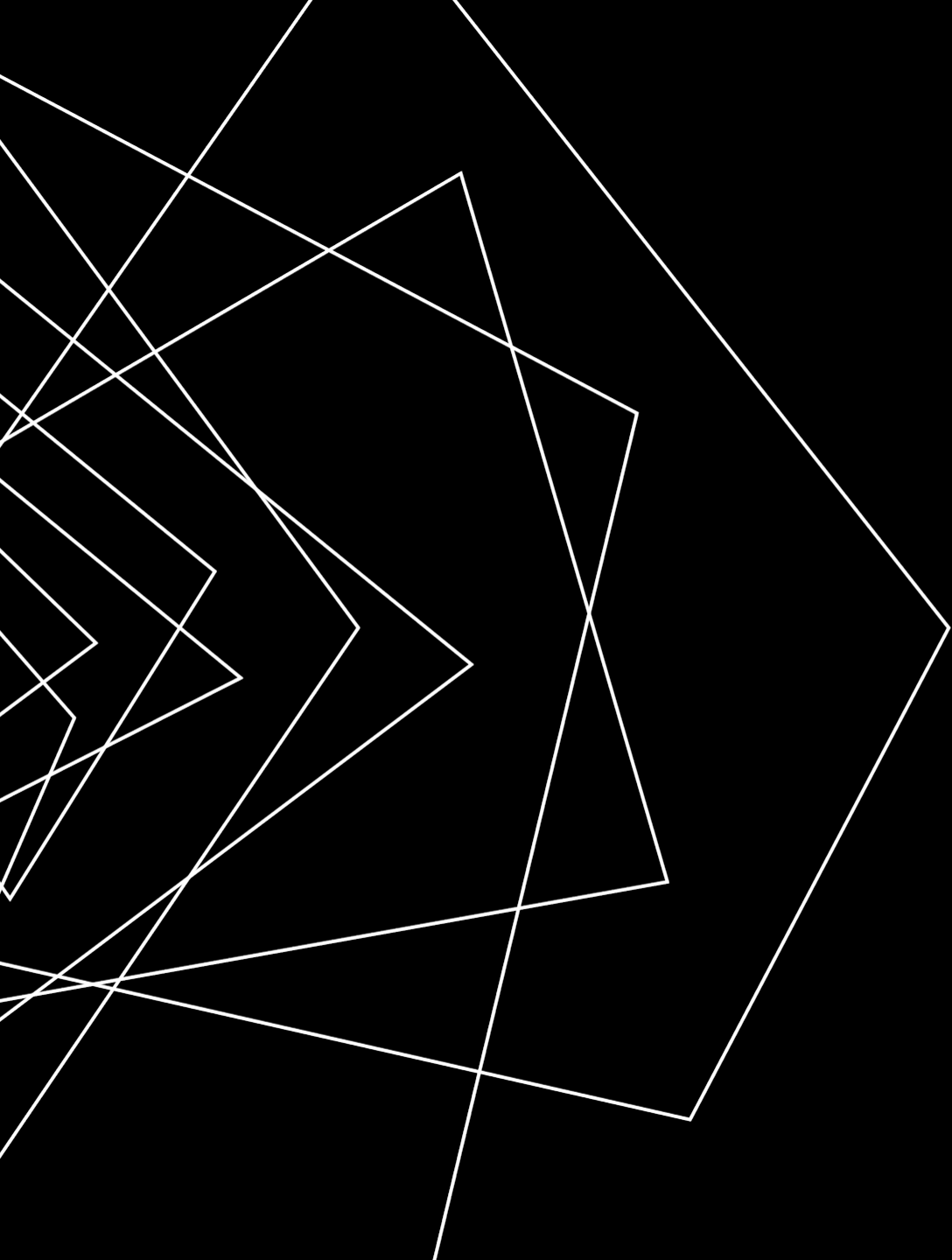
